You will have the opportunity to express your opinions, make any suggestions and propose revisions and/or amendments to these proposals at the next General Meeting on June 13th.

These Proposals are included here to give you the opportunity to review them prior to the General Meeting.

## (PROPOSAL) DEFINITIONS

EMPLOYER-PURCHASER - A person who purchases the services of our musicians through a Contractor or Booking Agent. The Contractor or Booking Agent will assume the duties and specifics of the engagement. The Purchaser will be responsible for the payment of the music services rendered. A contract must be signed between the Purchaser and the Contractor/Booking Agent.

BOOKING AGENT/CONTRACTOR - A person recognized by the Union and who agrees to provide musicians and orchestra for any engagement and who agrees to abide by Federation and Local By-Laws. For the sake of providing guarantees to musicians and to themselves, Booking Agents/Contractors shall file a copy of the contract for each engagement with the Union Local.

CONTRACTOR - A member of the Union who hires musicians for the purchaser. A Contractor/Booking Agent acts as an intermediary for the purchaser and the musicians. The Contractor may appoint a Leader to take charge of the engagement. The Contractor is liable for the payment to musicians he/she hires. He/she shall abide by all rules and regulations of the Union Local.

CONTRACTOR/LEADER - A person who acts as a Contractor (see CONTRACTOR) but is also the Leader on the engagement. He/she exercises the wishes of the Purchaser according to the rules of the Union. He/she is liable for the payment and conditions of employment of the musicians. Contractor/Leader shall receive Leader's pay (see LEADER) in addition to a Contractor's Fee.

LEADER - A musician appointed by a Contractor to be in charge of the engagement in accordance with the wishes of the Contractor and the Purchaser. Leaders are not liable or responsible for the payment of musicians. Whenever a Contractor wishes to have a Leader hire the musicians, then the Leader will assume the responsibilities of all musicians hired to perform the engagement and whatever other duties entrusted to him/her by the Contractor or Booking Agent. Leaders shall receive additional pay equal to 50% of scale for said engagement.

- E. NEW YEAR'S EVE CONTRACTS: If a Casual contracted player for New Year's Eve starts a Steady Engagement, notice must be given to Contractor of Casual Engagement no later than November 1st, only if player starts a steady job.

#### (SCHEDULE XIII., E., cont.)

All New Year's Eve lists of contracted musicians and copies of contracts are to be submitted to the Local office. Failure to abide by this rule be subject to penalty.

F. For rehearsals of any kind under this heading, call the Local office or consult the Executive Board.

# (WAGE LIST PROPOSAL) SCHEDULE XVI. DOUBLING:

- A. When a musician plays one or more doubles during any session or during any unit of overtime, he/she shall be paid an additional 25% of the applicable session rate and the overtime rate related thereto for the first double and an additional 15% of such rate for each double thereafter.
- B. All combinations of instruments are construed as doubles except instruments within the following respective groups which are not construed as doubling:
  - 1.) Piano & Celeste (when furnished)
  - 2.) Drummer's standard kit, consisting of:
    Bass Drum, Snare Drum, Cymbals, Gongs,
    Piatti, small traps and tom-toms when used as
    part of a standard kit.
  - 3.) Mallet Instruments: Xylophone, Vibraharp, Bells, Marimbas
  - 4.) Latin Rhythm Instruments: Any Latin Rhythm Instrument when used in less than eight bars in connection with any other instrument or used not in a rhythm pattern shall not in any event be a doubling instrument.

#### Live-PALRA

In 1935, Congress passed the Wagner Act (National Labor Relations Act) on the principal that American workers could organize themselves into labor unions and be represented by their unions. The law addressed industrial unions, but entertainers (whose needs were atypical to other industries) were not recognized in Labor Law. This trend has prevailed, even though there have been accomodations for other laborers (Taft-Hartley Act, 1947; Landrum-Griffith Act, 1959) who also had unique needs that left them unsupported by U.S. Labor Law. In the late 1960's, the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) began to assert jurisdiction over the live entertainment area of the music business. Currently, (according to the interpretations of U.S. Labor Law by the NLRB) a musician performing in the live entertainment area is not recognized as an "employee" of the Purchaser (hotel, nightclub, etc.) of his/her services, but is considered an "independent contractor". The NLRB goes further to state that, as musicians are not "employees" of the Purchaser of their services, they are not entitled to be included in the collective bargaining unit, and therefore, cannot be rep-

-resented by their Union. The Live Performing Artists Labor Relations Act (Live-PALRA) was first introduced to Congress in 1983, and has had several near misses to getting the neccesary votes to be passed into law. Language in this bill (HR.226, S.481) will change the status of live musicians from "independent contractor" to "employee", and will finally recognize the Purchaser as their "employer". This bill makes specific provisions in U.S. Labor Law for live performers that will help to allow improvements in the quality of our lives. You can help get action on this bill by contacting our Local office (401-941-2717) and signing pre-addressed post cards that have been prepared for mailings to Senator Claiborne Pell (RI - former sponsor of S.481), Senator John Chafee (RI). Senator Paul Simon (IL - current sponsor of S.481) and Representative Jack Reed (RI). Representative Ron Machtley (RI) and Representative Dale Kildee (MI - current sponsor of HR.226). This is the most important piece of legislation relevant to our livelyhood that has been put before the Congress in almost a century. It would be foolish for any of us to ignore the opportunity to rally support for legislation that can help improve the quality of our lives.
