Mr. Pinter is the vice-president of the Polka Hall of Fame and he sent letters to the Mayor and Milwaukee festival officials suggesting the monument be built on a Lake Michigan island just off the city's Summerfest grounds.

He would also like it to be the home to the offices of the Wisconsin Polka Hall of Fame, with space for shops and restaurants and maybe even a polka museum.

"THE AMERICAN BAND"

The American Band traces it's roots back to the 1830's and has appeared in just about every town and city in R.I. (as well as near-by states) and does about a dozen concerts each season.

They have chosen Gene Pollart, the URI Band Director, as their new director. He has been acting director of this 60-piece ensemble since the death last year of Francis Marciniak. Gene was one of four finalists for the job. He has taught at URI for the past twenty years, played with the Fresno Philharmonic, and performed with various jazz combos.

"WELL, IT'S ABOUT TIME!!"

Anna Lelkes has played the harp for the Vienna Philharmonic for 26 years, but was always an outsider. She recently became a full member when the orchestra decided to admit women for the first time in it's 155-year history. It had been the last world-class symphony orchestra to bar women.

"MUSIC FOR YOUR OPERATION?"

What will it be? What music would you like to select to be played while your operation is going on? This is what's happening. Surgery patients can select what they'd like to hear during their operations and it can improve their experiences markedly, researchers from the University of Buffalo found in a study of 40 people undergoing outpatient eye surgery.

Those patients who listened to their music had lower heart rates, blood pressure and cardiac workload than those who didn't hear music, the researcheers reported to the annual meeting in Santa Fe of the American Psychosomatic Society.

"AFTER 55YRS - WHITE CHRISTMAS 2ND1!"

Bing Crosby's "White Christmas" has just dropped into second place after selling 30 million copies since its release 55 years ago. The song "Candle In The Wind '97" (which is Elton John's tribute to Princess Diana) (after just 37 days after its release!!) has been declared the world's biggest-selling single recording. The Guinness Book of Records said that nearly 31.8 million copies have been sold. AMAZING!

AFM ASSESSMENT:

In the September FANFARE, I gave you my report on the June International Convention. As part of that report I mentioned that we would have a one-time \$10.00 assessment instead of the \$12.00 Per Capita raise which would have been a permanent raise in everyone's dues!

The way the Resolution that was accepted at the Convention reads is as follows: "Each Local shall pay to the Federation a special assessment of \$10.00 per member to be paid in two parts: \$5.00 in the first year (1998) and \$5.00 in the second year (1999). The first \$5.00 assessment (which is to be used exclusively to pay for outstanding Federation debts) shall be based on the number of Local members in good standing on January 1, 1998, and shall be paid to the AFM no later than February 15, 1998. The second \$5.00 assessment (\$1.50 of which is to be expended for organizing and recruitment and \$1.00 of which is to be expended for head-quarters relocation) shall also be based on the same number of Local members reported in good standing on January 1, 1998, and shall be paid no Later than February 15, 1999.

"Locals shall pass the assessment through to their members"

"A Local may seek prior written consent from the International Executive Board to absorb amy portion or all of the assessment."

[In other words, if we would have held a fund-raiser (like a Cavalcade of Bands, etc.) and raised \$2,500.00. Then, we could have picked up this first \$5.00 assessment for the membership. We didn't do that, so the members will have to pay the \$5.00 assessment by February of 1998.

Maybe we can hold some sort of fundraiser next year and pick up that second \$5.00 assessment for the membership.] One other thing to point out:
"A member of more than one Local may petition the International Secretary-Treasurer in writing for a rebate equal to the amount of the assessment paid by that member in excess of \$5.00 in each year (1998 and 1999.)"

So, bottom line, pay Bennie \$5.00 extra in the first quarter of 1998 for your special assessment placed on you by International law.
