SAGNELLA RESIGNS AS SECRETARY-TREASURER

OCTOBER CAVALCADE ADDS NEW FUNDS

Cavalcade Chairman and Vice President Al DeAndrade has reported that the October Cavalcade has added \$5,339 to the union treasury.

Monies are used for the Health and Welfare Fund and the new Survivors Benefit Program.

The Local and Al DeAndrade thank all the musicians who participated. In the Ballroom, Ed Drew provided strolling musicians and the big bands were led by Art Medeiros and Dick Parent. Hank Doiron sang with the Strollers and Terri Giviens sang with the Dick Parent Orchestra.

The bands in the lobby were: The Nomads, Ed Drew's Dixieland Pops, Mike Renzi's Ensemble with Bonnie Mann on vocals, Bombay Jim and the Swingin' Sapphires, Bob and Jennifer Mainelli and The Holiday and the Tommy Terren Septet.

The MCs were Bill Pandozzi, Johnny Nardo, Rick 'Swing Daddy' Orcutt and Steve Bianchi. Working the door were Jan Marquez, Lydia Desjarlais, Donna Generoux, Lorraine Lisi, Elaine Baskins and Anna Trandicosta.

An appreciation dinner was given on Tuesday, November 9 for the participating musicians.

Bob Sagnella, the popular Secretary-Treasurer of the Local, has resigned to take up residence in Florida.

Sagnella was elected in November, 2003, when offices of Secretary and Treasurer were combined upon the retirements from office of Ed Skeffington and Bennie Pazienza. Sagnella had also previously served in those positions when they were independent offices under the tenure of Joe Conte.

INSURANCE DROPPED; BENEFIT PROGRAM ADOPTED BY MEMBERS

The long-standing insurance program has been dropped and in its place the members have adopted a new benefit program.

Based on a resolution by Board Member John Worsley, the Benefit Program, approved by the By-Law Committee in September and at a General Meeting in October, provides \$1,000 to the beneficiaries after the death of any member in good standing. The program went into effect on December 1.

The By-Law Committee consists of Ella Leone, Agnooni Baligian, Manny Thetonia. It rewrote Article XVI of the by-laws to accommodate the changes.

An election for a Secretary-Treasurer will be held in November, 2005. Until that time, President Artie Cabral has appointed member Clair. Fancher to fill the position. Fancher has business background in finance and computers. Cabral is allowed under the by-laws to appoint persons to vacancies that become open in a period of less than one year before the election. The Executive Board approved Cabral's appointment.

Sagnella said that he might return to visit New England in some summer months, perhaps residing in Massachusetts.

THE JOSEPH W. SILVEIRA MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Mr. Silveira's lifelong passion was music. He learned to play the trombone as a young boy in school and was a member of his high school band.

Music gave him an opportunity to see the country. As a young man he played for a variety of bands and traveled to every state in the continental United States.

Through music, Mr. Silveira made friendships with other musicians that lasted a lifetime.

Music also played a role in his choice of mates. He met his wife, Carmella, at a dance hall. She loved to dance and listen to jazz.

He instilled the love of music in his children was well. He had a large record

collection and family time was spent listening and singing by the 'victrola.' As young children, all of his daughters sang and performed at social functions. Jane and Jean took guitar lessons. Jane studied piano while living in Florida and continued her studies at The Music School in Rhode Island. Linda was an avid singer and member of the church choir.

As a professional musician, Mr. Silviera played for hundreds of celebrities including Liberace, Wayne Newton, Diana Ross, Barry Manilow, Tom Jones, Jim Nabors, Johnny Carson, The Fifth Dimension, Gladys Knight and the Pips, Florence Henderson, Buddy Hackett and Sammy Davis Jr., to name a few. He also

played for various television productions, including the Miss U.S. A. Pagent.

With a strong desire to share his love of music, he taught many young boys and girls how to play the trombone and the trumpet as an instructor at both the Charles Bean Music Studio and the Ray Mullens Music Studio.

The Joseph W. Silveira Memorial Scholarship Fund will sponsor students who possess the same passion for music but need financial assistance to make their musical dreams come true. The fund will be administered by The Music School of the Rhode Island Philharmonic.

Life Members: Board accepted John Scotti unanimously as a Life Member.


