Early Study Skills Led To Professional Activites For Dan Branca Later In Life

Dan Branca learned some skills as a young man that led to professional activities as an adult.

At age 5 he was learning to play music. He developed into an accordion player, and when he studied with Harry Smith at Berklee College of Music in the early 1950s, after time in the military, he also became a piano player. He has been working through the years and has been in this Local for the past 51 years.

As a young man he also learned soccer. "it was big in my neighborhood," he said, and "we would play in sandlots and on the streets. Soccer was big in Providence then, and my junior high had a team. For a bunch of kids we learned to play quite well, and when we scrimmaged a Brown University team we brought them to a 2-2 tie.

"What helped was our Italian lan-

Members Vote at General Meeting

Five proposals presented by the Law Committee, and a proposal of the Wage Scale Committee were passed at a General Meeting of the Local on Tuesday, July 15 at union headquarters.

The proposal that failed was "Recommendation #3" (see the July issue for the full text of recommendations) that would have eliminated "powers to legislate" by the Executive Board" between General Membership meetings (Article III, Section 5, Paragraph H on the By-laws).

Vice President Al DeAndrade asked the law committee presenter Manny Thetonia how the Local could operate if the proposal passed. "Would the Local have to wait for General Meetings to conduct any business?" DeAndrade asked. Member Dick McGuinn voiced similar concerns, and after further brief discussion the recommendation was defeated.

Another proposal, Recommendation #1, was sent back to the Law Committee for further study on a motion by Executive Board member John Worsley, seconded by Executive Board Member Richard Salzillo, after major opposition to the proposal was made by members Duke Belaire, Ed Drew and McGuinn. The recommendation would have allowed the Executive Board to set the Local's business office hours. "There should be some specific hours in the By-Laws," Belaire said. "This would allow some flexibility, depending on union business," Secretary-Treasurer Ed Plunkett said.

McGuinn countered by saying

guage. We shouted plays to each other and the Brown students didn't know what we were saying."

Dan went on as a center and inside right to play on five professional teams. "I was honored to be selected to be in the Soccer Hall of Fame. I was installed with a great Pawtucket Rangers player, a big redhead by the name of Walter Dick. "The Rangers had won the National Cup Championship in 1941," Dan said. "That was some team. We had many good teams in the Southern New England League. In that league I played with several Portuguese teams and the Thornton Vicks."

Dan was proud of two events in his soccer career: that in one game he scored five goals and that in a championship game he won the game in the last two minutes. "I had a hard shot," Dan said. "They were grass cutters, and often hard for goalies to stop. That's how I got five goals in one game But in the championship game I had the ball about 20 yards out. There was no score and only two minutes left. I fired the ball high. It caught the goalie by surprise and it went over his head and into the goal .It was a good shot, but I was lucky also. We won the championship with that". Dan is proud of his years in music and in soccer, and he attends most of the General Membership meetings. "I like to keep up on what is going on. I love this Local," Dan said.

3. A proposal by Vice President Al DeAndrade to revise a wage scale for Big Bands approved at the July membership meeting.

Resolution 1 sought to allow the Executive Board to openly set office hours for the Local. The members wanted the proposal to offer more specific guidelines.

DeAndrade wants to change Big Band (14 members or more) wages on Monday and Tuesday nights from the approved \$75 for three hours to \$50. Dancing would be allowed. DeAndrade would not try to change the price for other nights of dancing, leaving it at \$75.

Ed Drew, speaking for the Wage Scale Committee introduced a resolution at the July membership meeting that made changes in the wage scale for Theater Musicians. It will be up for a vote on Sept. 9. The changes are: three hours work from \$135 to \$160; rehearsals from \$95 to \$105 on the same day, and from \$106 to \$118 on another day; overtime from \$27 to \$32 per half-hour, and sound checks from \$45 to \$50.

PROVIDENCE FEDERATION REJOINS CENTRAL LABOR COUNCIL

The Executive Board voted unanimously to rejoin the Providence Central Labor Council on a motion by Vice President DeAndrade, after the Board had heard a plea from the long-time head of the Council, Paul McDonald. De Andrade had invited McDonald to the meeting.

McDonald said the major reason to affiliate with the Council is to join with other union representatives, such as construction, nurses, hotels and restaurants, to work together in unity. Those unions had sent workers to help the Federation in a strike several years

ago at PPAC when Jerry Lewis had hired a student band to work as "scabs" in place of union musicians.

In many ways, the Council, though a member of the parent AFL-CIO, has become an alternate unity group for the AFL-CIO.

Membership dues in the Council are ten cents per month per member. This would cost this Local \$40 per month. The Executive Board agreed that if the unity mission was not a help to this Federation a reverse vote, dropping out again, could be taken.

The agreement becomes effective in August.

Committee Reports

By-Laws Committee

Chairman Manny Thetonia reports out seven (7) recommendations for resolutions to amend the By-Laws.

Recommendation 1 – Resolution for Name Correction and Change to Hours of Operation (Article I, Section1). After discussion, Board Member Worsley moves to bring the recommendation to a vote at the membership meeting in July.

Recommendation 2 - Resolution to Change Executive Board Meeting Time (Article III, Section 5, Paragraph (B)). S/T Plunkett explains that the change is needed to provide time to receive and process the monthly bank statements, in order to present accurate financial statements at the monthly Executive Board Meetings. VP DeAndrade asks chairman Thetonia to clarify whether the By-Laws permit members to attend meetings of the Executive Board and, if there is no specific reference in the by-Laws, to add language to this resolution clarifying the members' right to attend. Member Arthur Medeiros moves to bring the resolution to a vote at the July membership meeting. Board Member Salzillo seconds. The motion carries.

Recommendation 3 – Resolution to remove legislative powers of Executive Board (Article III, Section 5, Paragraph (H). After discussion, Board Member Worsley moves to refer the recommendation back to the By-Laws Committee and to direct the committee to consult the Local's attorney for an interpretation of this clause. The motion is severally seconded and carries.

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Recommendation 4 - Resolution to expand Indoctrination Committee to Recruitment and Indoctrination Committee (Article II, Section 8; Article XIV, Sections 1 and 5). EBM Worsley inquires how the AFM's new on-line application system would affect the committee's ability to "check and certify applicants". S/T Plunkett indicates that the Executive Board has final approval of all applicants, even online applicants. Board Member Worsley moves to bring the resolution to a vote at the July meeting. The motion is severally seconded and carries.

Recommendation 5 – Resolution to create an annual budget process (Article V, Section 1). S/T Plunkett explains the fiscal importance of establishing a budget process, both for understanding the costs involved in operating the Local and also to provide defined, but limited, authority to the Secretary-Treasurer to conduct the financial affairs of the Local. VP DeAndrade moves to present the resolution to the July meeting for a vote. Board Member Salzillo seconds. The motion carries.

Recommendation 6 – Resolution to eliminate duplicative paragraphs (Article V, Section 3, Paragraph (C) and Article V, Section 4). Chairman Thetonia explains that the language of these two clauses is redundant and that they should be combined into one paragraph and the duplicate language deleted. Board Member Worsley moves to send the resolution to the July meeting for a vote. Board Member Salzillo seconds. The motion carries.

Recommendation 7 – Resolution to explicitly specify the name of the official journal, *Fanfare* (Article V, Section 8). After discussion,

Hartford Local – S/T reports that the president of the Hartford Local. Joe Messina, has called several times in regard to the show "If You're Irish", which played in Lowell Ma., Hartford, Ct, and at PPAC in Providence in March. President Messina wants to bring charges against the contractor, Bruce Hopkins, a member of the Providence Local, for failing to file a contract and for paying below (Hartford) scale. Messina has been very insistent on having the Providence Local participate in his claim against member Hopkins. S/ T reports that the appropriate work dues were paid to the Local for the Providence performance. No complaints have been received from any players in the orchestra, most of whom are members of other locals. Given the lack of complaints from players at the Providence performance, the EB declines to participate in the Hartford Local's complaint.

Night Life Orchestra – Regarding the advertisement and picture of the Night Life Orchestra, as discussed at the February 19 EB meeting, S/T reports a conversation with one of the union members in the picture, who stated that the picture was over 15 years old and was used without his permission. He is not performing with the Night Life Orchestra, a non-union band.

Committee Reports

Cavalcade of Bands, May 28, 2008 - VP, as Chairman, pre-

sents the final report for the Cavalcade of Bands held at Rhodeson-the-Pawtuxet on May 28, 2008. Paid attendance was \$8,675.00. Expenses were \$2,366.00. Net profit was \$6,309.00. EBM Worsley moves to accept the Chairman's Report. EBM Salzillo seconds. The motion carries.

Summer Dance, August 26, 2008. VP, as Chairman, recommends that the dance to be held on August 26, 2008 be called a "Summer Dance" and be sponsored by the Local. The reason for a different name is to avoid confusing this dance with the regular Cavalcade, since there will be only one band in the Ball Room and four bands in the foyer. VP notes that John Badessa's big band will perform in the Ball Room. The four bands in the foyer have not been secured at this time. The time for the dance will be from 6:30 until 10:30.

Golf Tournament – VP, as Chairman, reports on the Golf Outing. He is trying to expand the committee for more help. He is looking for tee sponsors and for additional golfers. The fee for the tournament will be \$120.00 per player. The fee for dinner only will be \$35.00. The tournament will be held at the Valley Country Club on Tuesday, August 19.

By-Law Committee -- Manny Thetonia, Chairman, reports on the By-Law Committee meeting of June 9, 2008. He states that the Recommendations that were referred back to his committee at the General Meeting on June 3 were discussed and cleared to be brought up at the next General Meeting.

Providence Central Labor Council – VP states that, because of scheduling issues, he has postponed the appearance by Paul MacDonald, the Executive Director

of the Providence Central Labor Council, to address the EB, until the next EB meeting in July.

They would like to make a group presentation at the Local's headquarters sometime in September. EBM Worsley suggests that they purchase an ad in the Fanfare inviting members to such a meeting. They agree to do so. They were instructed to be in touch with S/T to work out the details...

"set whatever hours work for you, but have some specific ideas in the By-Laws." The membership agreed.

The five Law Committee recommendations that were passed are:

- #2, which sets the Executive Board meetings on the first Wednesday after the 15th of the month:
- #4, which broadens the powers of the Indoctrination Committee to include recruitment of members;
 - #5, which calls for the Sec-

retary-Treasurer to create an annual budget;

- #6, which gives the Executive Board legislative powers, subject to federal laws;
- #7, which gives this publication, *Fanfare*, powers to be the "official" notifier of union business to the membership.
- A proposal of the wage scale committee, Big Band wages under Schedule V of Casual Engagements, also passed.

"Dances are social engagements," Belaire said, and "players should be paid accordingly." Previously wages for big bands were set by the Executive Committee. Schedule V engagements pay musicians \$75 for three hour engagements and a \$100 for four hours. The Monday-Tuesday nights "jazz scale"--with no dancing---remains the same.

Vice President DeAndrade has a proposal in the Wage Scale committee that proposes paying musicians \$50 for three hour engagements, dancing allowed, on Monday and Tuesday nights. See a separate story under "September General Meeting" on page 3.
